

Obituaries

Professor Stephen Lee (AM) 1948 - 2023


orn in China in 1948, Prof Lee's parents had the foresight to move to Hong Kong in 1949 just before the Chinese Revolution. During his early years, fate brought him in touch with a Hungarian Australian who would later sponsor his immigration to Australia in 1965. He attended Randwick Boys High School and, after only 3 years of speaking English, he qualified for a Wesley College Scholarship to enter Sydney Medical School, graduating in 1974 with first class honours.

In 1979, Prof Lee passed his DDM qualification at the University of Sydney and became a Fellow of College in 1981. For 37 years he held the position of visiting dermatologist at Royal Prince Alfred Hospital (1982 - 2019), as well as positions at Rachel Forster, Balmain, Ryde and Concord Repatriation Hospitals in Sydney, and the Manning River Hospital in Taree, NSW. In 1996 until 2018, Prof Lee was the Head of the Department of Dermatology at Concord Repatriation Hospital.

Prof Lee contributed tirelessly to College and was the Assistant Honorary Secretary from 1997, becoming the Honorary Secretary in 1999 until 2004. He was the Editor of The Mole and Executive Editor of the ACD Annual Report during this period and also served as the inaugural International Affairs Office for College until 2006.

For 12 years, from 2002 until 2014, Prof Lee was the first dermatologist to become a Director and Federal Councillor and Dermatology Representative for the Australian Medical Association, a position he was very passionate about, especially in the area of public health. In recognition for his service to medicine in the field of dermatology as a clinician, mentor and educator, he was appointed Member in the Order of Australia in 2009 and received the Sydney University Wesley Foundation Medal in 2011.

Over 15 years from 2004, Prof Lee was appointed Visiting Professor at the China Medical University, Clinical Associate Professor within Central and Concord Clinical Schools



and Honorary Clinical Associate Professor in the Chinese University of Hong Kong. He was recognised as a Clinical Professor in the Division of Dermatology of Sydney Medical School, a teaching position he held until he retired due to ill health in 2019.

The Royal Prince Alfred Hospital was the birthplace of his medical training and, sadly, it was to be the place where Stephen courageously drew his last breath on Sunday 5 March 2023.

The outpouring of affection and love for Prof Lee has been overwhelming. Particularly from his former trainees, now fully fledged dermatologists, whom at some point along their medical training were touched by his wit, brilliance and passion and his everlasting refrain of "Patients First".

Dr John Henry Steele-Smith 1929 - 2023

r John Steele-Smith was a founding member of the Australasian College of Dermatologists and prior to the formation of College had been a member of DAA and BAD.

Dr Steele-Smith was born in 1929 and attended Fort St High School before studying Medicine at Sydney University (then the only university in Sydney). He graduated in 1952.

After graduation he became a Junior Resident Medical Officer at Sydney hospital and in the following years at Concord Repatriation General Hospital where his interest


in dermatology began. In the following years he commenced training for the DDM whilst also working as a General Practitioner and in 1958 to 1960 was Registrar in Dermatology at Royal Prince Alfred Hospital Camperdown NSW.

Having received the DDM in 1960 he commenced practise in dermatology with rooms in Macquarie St Sydney and Belmore St Burwood. He had consultant positions at Sydney Hospital, Concord Repatriation General Hospital, North Ryde Psychiatric Hospital and Auburn Hospital.

During this time Dr Steele-Smith also had a practice in Auburn, Liverpool, Campbelltown and from 1976, in Beecroft. He retired in 1998.

Dr Steele-Smith was a family man and an active member of his Church. He had interests in farming and great joy in many friendships, especially in his local Probus Group.

Dr Steele-Smith passed away on 23 March 2023 and is survived by his wife Alice (also a member of the Australasian College of Dermatologists) and his children and their families.





Using our voice to inform and influence the national health policy conversation

We strive to be recognised as a trusted adviser and first port of call for governments and other organisations seeking expertise on skin health and dermatological care.

> ne of the many ways we do this is by maintaining an active voice among key health policy stakeholders. Participation in consultation processes is an important part of our broader policy and advocacy strategy with the aim of boosting our visibility among government, non-government and other influential health stakeholders.

College has built on its policy and advocacy capacity over the past six years and the high-level of policy activity since 2017 has been sustained. Between 2021 and 2022, College made a total of 87

submissions. Of those, 85% were to the Federal, State or Territory Governments. Seventy-two percent of these government submissions were to the Federal Government. This level of activity has been sustained in 2023 with 27 submissions to governments alone so far this year. Topics have ranged from the key issues of health workforce and access to care; to advertising, cosmetic surgery and other regulatory reforms; to national and jurisdictional plans, strategies and policies for skin cancer, mental health, medicines and climate change to name a few. Other topics included scope of

practice issues, radiation safety and artificial intelligence, as well as Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) Poisons Standard amendments, and Pharmaceutical Benefit Scheme (PBS) and Medicare Benefits Schedule (MBS) listings. They have also included proactive pre-election and prebudget submissions to ministers, shadow ministers, members and candidates from all sides.

A number of these submissions, together with College's broader advocacy on a range of issues, have resulted in meetings with ministers and assistant ministers, their advisers and departmental staff providing the opportunity for valuable relationship building.

College has also previously responded to consultations and requests from non-government organisations including the Australian Medical Association (AMA), Royal Australian and New Zealand College of Radiologists (RANZCR), Royal Australasian College of Surgeons (RACS), National Aboriginal Community Controlled Health Organisation (NACCHO) and state-based Cancer Councils.

Advocacy is a long game and not without its challenges. While we have seen positive results in terms of our workforce advocacy, other areas have been more challenging and require ongoing effort.

Our ability to respond to this volume of activity reflects both the growth in College's capacity and the ongoing and tireless work of the many College Fellows who have contributed their time and expertise to informing these submissions, as well as College guidelines, position statements and broader advocacy.

Our particular thanks go to the members of College's Expert Advisory Committee, chaired by A/Prof Stephen Shumack who now steps down from that role. A/Prof Shumack has served as Chair since the Committee's inception in 2017 and has been a tireless source of wisdom, guidance and support. His responsiveness to the many and varied queries that flow in, often with short turnaround times has enabled many a deadline to be met. We look forward to working with Dr Warren Weightman who succeeds him in the role of Chair.

A number of new members have joined the committee in recent months bringing valuable expertise. As we welcome them, we sincerely thank those members who have recently stepped down – Prof H Peter Soyer, Prof Alan Cooper and Prof Kurt Gebauer – for their extensive advice and valued contributions over their many years of service on the Committee.




Figure 1. Proportions of submissions 2021-22

Number of government submissions 2014-2022 (YTD)




Figure 2. Number of submissions

Northern Territory FATES Project: Evaluation of a rotational supervisory model for dermatology care

College's Flexible Approach to Training in Expanded Settings (FATES) project in Top End Northern Territory (NT) is continuing to make great progress. So far, eight visits have been completed to Darwin and Top End NT, with positive outcomes reported by both the visiting consultant dermatologists and trainee.

ollege has engaged the Menzies School of Health Research in the NT to help evaluate the success of the project. Recently, Annie Bygrave, ACD Policy Manager and Dr Sophie Pascoe, Senior Researcher at Menzies School of Health Research had an article published in the National Rural Health Alliance's issue 82 of *Partyline*. The article titled, *A rotational supervisory model for dermatology care* details the positive outcomes of increased consultant capacity created through this project and led by FACD Dr Dev Tilakaratne to enrich the trainee experience and to improve skin health outcomes for patients in Darwin and Top End.

The article was a wonderful opportunity to highlight College's commitment to addressing regional, rural, and remote workforce challenges to improve access to care. The full article is available <a href="https://example.com/here/bases/



Tasmanian FATES Pilot: Opening up opportunities for training and future workforce sustainability in Tasmania

College is pleased to announce that we have received Federal Government funding for a pilot to support the training of specialist dermatologists in Tasmania. The pilot aims to address workforce shortages by increasing opportunities for local doctors to work and train in their home state.

The project will focus on improving pathways for dermatology trainees wishing to train in Tasmania whilst simultaneously increasing access to specialist care for local communities by building the supervisory capacity needed to re-establish training, which ceased in 2015, at Royal Hobart Hospital.

The funding was awarded under the Federal Government's Flexible Approach to Training in Expanded Settings (FATES) program and involves innovative approaches to training in rural and remote areas.

The 2-year project will fund up to 0.4 FTE consultant capacity at Royal Hobart Hospital complementing the current 0.1 FTE service. This enables two Hobart based dermatologists, Dr Narelle Bleasel and Dr Jonathon Ng to take up public appointments at RHH, as well as two newly graduated dermatologists of Tasmanian origin to transition to rural practice in their home state with public appointments at RHH.

They will join Dr Andrew Jevtic, currently the only dermatologist delivering public services at RHH, to build a robust dermatology department to deliver sustainable

dermatology services to the Tasmanian communities now and into the future. This additional consultant FTE opens up supervisory capacity to reinstate training at RHH.

In establishing a high quality, sustainable service delivery and training hub for the region, this project will increase the dermatology presence in Tasmania and provide the local workforce with valuable exposure to dermatologists and the dermatology career pathway, as well as the opportunity for Tasmanians pursuing, or keen to pursue careers as specialist dermatologists to train and practice in their home state.

"This project will enable me to transition to practice in Tasmania which is my home state and provide a much-needed service to the community of Tasmania. Further, it will provide other young doctors greater exposure to dermatology and I hope will inspire more local trainees to apply for the training program, and ultimately practice in their home state," says Dr Anthea Mulcahy, one of the recently graduated dermatologists who will be transitioning to RHH through the program.

As well as providing trainees rotating to Tasmania with exposure to varied expertise and mentorship from dermatologists, the project also uses a multidisciplinary training approach involving adjacent specialties, private practice experience, as well as continued networking and education from our Victorian Faculty, all aimed at creating a high quality, positive experience. The project aims to provide trainees and newly graduated dermatologists with the opportunity to develop collegial relationships with locally based Tasmanian specialists to assist in their training and encourage their future practice in Tasmania.

As noted by College Immediate Past President, Dr Clare Tait in our recent <u>media release</u>, encouraging a 'home-grown' workforce is a key goal of this project. "By offering local doctors the chance to train locally as well as a pathway for those who wish to transition back to their home state, this project will provide the community with a more sustainable workforce and help address workforce issues such as shortage and maldistribution."

The project demonstrates College's strong and growing track record of bringing together Federal and state governments, as well as public and private practice to provide tailored solutions to regional and rural training to address workforce issues and meet the unique needs of local communities. The Tasmanian project complements College's two existing FATES funded projects in Townsville and Darwin, each of which involve

close collaboration with local stakeholders, carefully tailored to the needs of the communities they service.

Addressing the shortage of dermatologists in rural, regional and remote areas is a core focus of College's advocacy agenda. Our constructive and collaborative relationship with the Federal Department of Health and Ageing on implementation of the National Medical Workforce Strategy and through the FATES program has been invaluable in enabling College to address a key enabler to workforce growth - supervisory capacity - and to pilot methods to build regional workforce sustainability longer term.

Key to the design of the Tasmanian project has been relationship building and close collaboration with the Tasmanian Department of Health over the past two years and with Royal Hobart Hospital (RHH), and other local stakeholders to identify workable solutions that address both short-term needs and crucially, lay strong foundations to build a sustainable homegrown workforce longer term. Our thanks also go to our Tasmanian based Fellows, past Victorian Faculty Chair Dr Jill Cargnello and current Chair Dr Aaron Robinson and College's Manager Advocacy and Health Workforce, Cathy Baynie for their ongoing commitment to this project.

We look forward to continuing to work in partnership to deliver this exciting project, which we hope will make a real difference in addressing workforce challenges and access to care for the Tasmanian communities.

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With the training program well underway for 2023, College saw the commencement of a higher than usual number of first years due to the UK and Singapore positions restarting in February 2023, as well as funding for additional training positions approved at a number of sites across the country.

he year commenced with College hosting the newly combined Evidence Based Medicine (EBM) workshop via the University of Melbourne and the procedural day of the 1st Year workshop. The EBM workshop took place over two days and was implemented to develop trainee evaluation skills, evidence-based practice and encourage future interest in contributing to scientific knowledge. The 3rd Year workshop was also held in March and returned to a face-to-face model similar to pre-COVID-19 years. Both workshops were sponsored by Janssen Pharmaceuticals and afforded trainees the opportunity to

come together for networking and well-earned socialising.

The Trainee Selection application round for placements in 2024 opened in February with higherthan-expected applications received. CV assessment will take place online over two weekends in May with face-to-face interviews to take place in August.

Work continues to progress with site accreditation, assessment of International Medical Graduates (IMG) and Specialist Training Program (STP) funding. Additional STP funding has been awarded to College for new training positions in rural settings, and the STP Taskforce has been tasked with

reviewing all existing STP positions with a view to funding new positions from College's reserve list to ensure that workforce and rural objectives of the STP funding program are being met. Victoria is due for reaccreditation this year and site visits will take place over a series of days later in the year. Extensive work has also commenced in preparation for the Fellowship Exams in June, July and August.

College continues to be appreciative of all members who give up their time to provide support for Training Program activities and committees. Thank you as always for your ongoing work and commitment.

DELIVERING HIGH QUALITY MEMBER SERVICES & SUPPORT

1. What has been your path on this project? Why did you, personally, decide to 'go green' and start My Green Doctor?

My path to going "green" started 20 years ago out of a concern for the environment, our resources and most of all, care for our patients. I am a member of the Florida Medical Association and I started My Green Doctor 12 years ago to provide real-life practical tips for all doctors. I also write a blog once every two months for the American Academy of Dermatology which is circulated as part of their newsletter.

2. How has going green impacted your practice?

Every business can save money right away by lowering their use of resources. This is particularly important in this competitive environment. As an example; Escambia County Health Department embraced sustainability and managed to save USD\$14,000 annually on their electricity bills. They subsequently invested that money into solar panels, and will now see even more savings.

Beyond the tangible impact on economics, I have found that going green is a real booster of staff morale. Staff are thrilled to be part of a bigger process where the practice is mindful of its impact globally. Patients gain trust in their doctor and they know that their doctor can help them make healthy choices


in the clinic and also at home. (See patient brochure)

3. How much do your colleagues/fellow doctors think about the environmental aspects of their business?

Most of my colleagues are so busy in their practices that it is a challenge to add one more item to the list. This is where it's important to start small. Commit 5 minutes to discuss sustainability in your monthly business meeting. The resources are readily available on the website and it's free. We have easy to follow workbooks, patient brochures, and simple steps you can action right away either at home or in your clinic.


4. Do you think the medical industry has been making strides in sustainability or is there a lack of awareness/more work to be done?

COVID-19 has had a negative impact on sustainability. Medical waste has increased exponentially and sadly these wasteful standards are now the norm. Some of my colleagues use single-use gloves even when engaging in a verbal consultation. It is important to review the evidence for each of our actions and set standards for them. Medical supply and pharmaceutical companies need to disclose to us the carbon footprint of their products so that we can make informed, environmentally-sound purchasing decisions.

5. What proportion of a practice's carbon footprint is directly related to the purchases of energy? Roughly 12%. This is Scope 2 of the E.P.A.'s classification of greenhouse gas emission. Scope 1 refers to direct emissions from health care facilities, Scope 2 refers to emissions from direct purchases of energy and Scope 3 is all other supply-chain emissions:



Scope 3 is huge and contributes about 82% of all GHG. This means that what we do at an individual or small practice level has a big impact.

6. Environmental sustainability seems to be a useful part of the medical curriculum. Are you aware of medical schools or specialist colleges who have incorporated this topic in America?

Yes. Dr Mary Williams is a Professor of Dermatology at University of California San Francisco and other dermatologists are working with the American Academy of Dermatology on this very matter. She would love to talk to your team or College to crosspollinate ideas.

Continuing Professional Development at the ASM

The recent ASM provided an opportunity for a unique Continuing Professional Development (CPD) session to promote an engaging and collaborative learning environment. The session followed an interview style discussion and gave Fellows the opportunity to ask questions about the program.

osted by Dr John Sullivan and Dr Sarah Hannam, this session covered the significance of audits and their role in healthcare improvement. Along with Dr Jeremy Banky, who outlined how audits can serve as the gold standard for evaluating and enhancing healthcare practices as demonstrated in the Mohs QAP, Dr Sullivan and Dr Hannam demonstrated how to make CPD work for you. The panel of Fellows included recent graduates with the challenges of a young family, those in their median specialist years, along with others nearing and considering transitioning to retirement. Panellists also included those solely in private practice, others in teaching institutions, and members who provide remote and regional services. Brief presentations and associated discussion shed light on the various aspects of CPD and offered the opportunity for robust discussion.

The discussion shifted to the challenges that healthcare professionals face when juggling CPD requirements and family responsibilities. Both Dr Hannam and Dr Mullan acknowledged the difficulties and emphasised the importance of understanding the CPD rules imposed by AHPRA. Dr Hannam and Dr Mullan advocated for open communication and the provision of resources to support practitioners in fulfilling their CPD requirements while accommodating personal circumstances, such as offering online courses, webinars, and alternative CPD activities.

The panel welcomed Dr Ian McCrossin and Dr Rosemary Nixon, who shared their experiences working in rural and remote areas. Dr McCrossin highlighted the unique CPD challenges faced in these locations, such as limited access to specialised training and professional networking

opportunities. Emphasising the role of technology in bridging these gaps, Dr McCrossin mentioned the use of teleconferencing, webinars, and online resources to stay connected with the medical community, access educational programs, and engage in virtual peer discussions. Additionally, both Dr McCrossin and Dr Nixon expressed their commitment to mentoring younger healthcare professionals, contributing to their CPD journey, and sharing expertise.

The panel delved into the wide range of activities that qualify for CPD. Dr Sullivan shared his involvement in various groups and how he formalises them to meet the CPD requirements. Dr Sullivan emphasised that participation in these dynamic communities facilitates knowledge exchange, idea generation, and staying updated on the latest advancements in the dermatology field. By being a part of these groups, Dr Sullivan has managed to enhance the CPD journey while fostering professional relationships that contribute to growth as a healthcare practitioner.

The informative discussion held during the CPD session at the ASM shed light on the importance of clinical audits, CPD rules, and the challenges faced by medical professionals. The feedback provided by the audience was centred around the AHPRA requirements for the new program which College has endeavoured to make as user friendly as possible for our members, but recognises there is still room for improvement. By embracing CPD opportunities and leveraging technology, healthcare professionals can stay at the forefront of medical advancements, delivering high quality care to their patients.

College has been engaged by the Royal Australasian College of Medical Administrators (RACMA) to be part of a project called "A Better Culture".

he project comes as a result of the recent Medical Training Survey that identified unacceptable levels of bullying, discrimination, racism, and harassment within the medical workforce.

The data shows that early career doctors witness and experience these adverse behaviours and identify other doctors as perpetrators. Given the link to patient safety, creating a positive workplace culture is a high priority.

The aim of this project is to design and develop a multi-faceted engagement strategy to address the long-standing issues in the culture of medicine in collaboration with all key stakeholders including specialist medical colleges, the Australian Medical Council (AMC), the Medical Board of Australia (MBA), the Australian Indigenous Doctors' Association (AIDA) and the Council of Presidents of

Medical Colleges (CPMC).

The intended outcome for the project is to confirm a tangible and achievable approach that will be adopted by all key stakeholders to enact genuine and sustained behavioural change across the whole of specialist medical training.

In response to this, College will be holding an interactive online session at 7:30PM, Thursday 27 July 2023.

The session, chaired by Dr Jillann Farmer, National Lead for the A Better Culture Project, will present an overview of the approach being taken, with an opportunity for participants to engage with this ambitious program through flash consultation on readiness, alignment and overall attitudes towards the project. There will be College representatives engaging in an open forum to encourage thoughts and conversation from attendees.








Update

Our new registrars have settled into their rotations well and we would also like to take the opportunity to send the fourth-year trainees our best wishes for their forthcoming Fellowship exams in June, July and August.

Clinical Trials Update

The Research and Clinical Trials Unit is excited to announce two new changes to the team that will help us further our mission of supporting high-quality dermatology clinical research.



Dr Cindy Kok has been appointed as the new Head of Clinical Trials and Research, and Dr Raaisa Islam has joined our team as the new Research Fellow. The Research and Clinical Trials Unit will continue to be committed to becoming leaders in dermatology clinical trials and research and making a significant impact in the dermatology research community.

The approval and commercialisation of biologic treatments for atopic dermatitis, such as Dupixent and Rinvog, has resulted in a new challenge in recruiting participants for studies focused on atopic dermatitis. As these treatments have become readily available, patients suffering from moderate to severe atopic dermatitis are less likely to participate in clinical trials, and dermatologists are less likely to refer patients to them. However, we continue with four clinical trials for atopic dermatitis. We also continue with three trials for hand eczema, alopecia, and psoriasis across our Darlinghurst and Westmead sites.

We are in the final stages of running a trial evaluating efficacy and safety of Deucravacitinib in 12-18 year olds with moderate to severe plaque psoriasis. Another trial on the horizon will investigate the efficacy, safety, and tolerability of ritlecitinib in both adults and adolescents with nonsegmental vitiligo.

Research Update

Our new Dermatology Research Fellow, Dr Raaisa Islam, is involved in several research projects, some of which are detailed here. Under the guidance of Dr Monisha Gupta, Dr Islam will continue the work of Dr Brent Doolan for quality improvement research into autologous noncultured epidermal cellular grafting for stable vitiligo. Currently, Dr Islam is part of the team led by Dr Andrea Tomiwaza investigating how the reflectance operative for surgical mapping prior to Mohs Micrographic Surgery of basal cell carcinoma. Finally, Dr Raaisa Islam is collaborating with Dr Matthew Lin in areas related to treatment of Bowen's disease.

We continue focusing on improving patient care and outcomes, including the Mohs' surgery Registry led by Dr Simon Lee and research projects for improving doctorpatient communication for Mohs patients.




Specialised care for Hidradenitis Suppurativa at our new clinic

Currently recruiting for clinical trials



We are seeking adults with a clinical diagnosis of atopic dermatitis (AD) to participate in two exciting clinical research trials. These trials aim to evaluate the safety and effectiveness of investigational treatments for moderate to severe AD.

The first trial is A Comparative Study of Oral Upadacitinib and Subcutaneous Dupilumab which is targeting adults with moderate to severe AD experiencing symptoms for at least 6 months. Participants will receive either oral Upadacitinib or subcutaneous Dupilumab during the treatment period. This trial aims to assess adverse events and measure the change in disease activity.

The second trial is *Investigational* Medication vs. Placebo Injection Study which is seeking participants with moderate to severe eczema involving at least 10% of body surface area. Patients who have a history of inadequate response to topical corticosteroids (TCS) may qualify for this trial which aims to evaluate the effectiveness of the investigational medication in managing AD symptoms.




